
SCHOOL ARRIVAL & DISMISSAL TIMES

COMMUNITY HUB

The Community Hub is open every day and is a space for parents and carers to come together to be engaged with the school and the community at large. Our Hub Leader, Hang, runs free programs for parents during school hours such as English classes, cooking demonstrations and information sessions in the Community Room located on the Kate Street entrance.

KINDA KINDER

Every Wednesday between $2.20-3.20\,\mathrm{pm}$ and Thursday, between $9\mathrm{am}-11\mathrm{am}$, we run a Kinda Kinder program in the library for pre-school children from 0-5 years. Children learn through play and creative activities as well as develop social skills through interaction with other children. This program is free of charge and children are asked to bring a light and healthy snack.



LITERACY NEWS

At St Albans Primary school, there is a whole school approach to improving literacy skills of all students and ensure literacy learning is of the highest quality in all classrooms for all students. This involves all staff working together with a literacy coach responding to student data then matching instruction to cater for the different needs of our learners.



What is currently happening in READING?

INDEPENDENT READING

Independent reading is when children have the opportunity to read for extended periods of time throughout the day, every day. Children will select their own reading materials from a wide variety of texts that they are able to read fluently and with ease. Independent reading is a quiet time where children can get 'lost' in a book or whatever they are reading. Teachers will work with students to monitor their reading ensuring they are reading to meet their individual needs and to improve their literacy skills.

Current research shows that it is necessary for children to read independently for a sustained period of time. This reading independence will be achieved slowly over the year with the support of classroom teachers.

In addition, your child will also work in a small reading group depending on their reading experience. This could be Modelled Reading, Shared Reading, Guided Reading, Reciprocal Teaching or take part in a Book Club. The focus for the reading may include help students learn a range of skills including:

- Comprehension
- Word work
- Monitoring meaning
- Phonics
- > Fluency
- word prediction
- story prediction



You can help at home by reading with your child each night and encouraging them to talk about what they have read. Enclosed you will find a list of possible questions to help you with conversations about your child's reading. They are not intended to be used all at once or every time you read with your child. Use them at your discretion and where they are appropriate. Happy Reading!!
